# Bachelor of Science (BSc)

With small class sizes, our approach is experiential and student-centered, applied and theoretical—combining critical thinking with the development of real-world knowledge and skills.

You will obtain significant experiences working closely with faculty in lab work and research, giving you the skills to succeed in any career or in applying to a professional or graduate program.

### **PROGRAM OPTIONS**

3-year degree (90 Credit Hours), 4-year degree or 4-year Honours degree (120 CH), and Co-operative learning option (see page 20) earning up to 9 CH of paid work experience. 2+2 (approximately 60 CH with diploma transfer – see page 23) available in Geography.





# Bachelor of Arts/Bachelor of Education Integrated (BA/BEd)


This program is intended for students who have a clear professional goal in mind of becoming an Early or Middle years teacher (students who wish to teach high school must complete another first degree then the B. Ed. After degree – see page 12).

The BA/BEd program gives students immediate access to teacher education. Students complete a Bachelor of Arts (Liberal Arts Distributed Major) while at the same time complete a Bachelor of Education. K-8 teachers are responsible for teaching all subject areas (including English, Math, Science, and Social Studies) while also focusing on two teachable subject areas.

Graduates are eligible to apply for a professional teacher's certificate in Manitoba, provided they are a Canadian Citizen, Permanent Resident, or hold a valid work visa.

# **PROGRAM LENGTH**

5-year (150 Credit Hours: 90 CH 3-year BA and 60 CH 2-year BEd)





# Bachelor of Education After Degree (BEd AD)

This program is intended for students who wish to pursue teaching at the Senior, Middle, or Early years level and who have already finished a first degree. You apply to the B. ED. AD program in the last year of your 3- or 4-year undergraduate degree (eg. Bachelor of Arts or Science, or Bachelor of Physical Education Studies).

Senior years teachers will focus on two teachable subject areas, and Early/Middle years teachers are responsible for teaching all subject areas (English, Math, Science and Social Studies) along with a focus on two teachable subject areas.

BrandonU.ca/ Education/Programs

Graduates are eligible to apply for a professional teacher's certificate in Manitoba, provided they are a Canadian Citizen, Permanent Resident, or hold a valid work visa.

# **PROGRAM LENGTH**

2-year (60 Credit Hours). Must have approved undergraduate degree to apply.

# Bachelor of **Physical Education Studies (BPES)**

This program allows students to choose from three streams to best suit their career goals.

**Teaching** – Designed for students who want to pursue a teaching career and advance to a Bachelor of Education After Degree while also receiving National Coaching Certification.

Exercise Science & Fitness - Designed for students who want to pursue careers in the field of Exercise Science and allied disciplines such as Kinesiology, Athletic Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Physiotherapy, Personal Training, and Fitness Leadership. This stream can also be taken in advance of the Bachelor of Education After Degree.

Recreation & Sport Management - Designed for students who want to pursue careers in the fields of recreation and sport.

# Education/Programs

### **CAREER PATHS**

Physical Education Teacher, Coach, Personal Trainer, Health Promotion, Recreation Coordinator, Provincial Sport Association, Sports Management, Community Development, Event Coordination. This degree provides preparatory courses for application towards advanced training in health sciences such as occupational therapy, physical therapy and athletic therapy.





# **PENT Indigenous Teacher Education**

PENT is a community-based teacher education program. Students combine paraprofessional work in their community schools from September to April with courses at Brandon University from April to July. The new program of studies is the Brandon University After Degree B.A./B.Ed. program in either the Early or Middle years area.

Student teaching is carried out during the school year in conjunction with paraprofessional work.

While studying on campus, students have access to a modern library and computer facilities. Studying with students from across Manitoba provides opportunities to interact professionally and socially with people from many other communities. Most classes are taught by regular

faculty at Brandon University. Graduates are eligible to apply for a professional teacher's certificate in Manitoba.

### **PROGRAM LENGTH**

Minimum of 6 summer sessions (150 Credit Hours)





# **Bachelor of Education (BEd)**

# (Technical Vocational Route)

Intended for students who have completed the Red River College Polytechnic Technical Vocational teaching diploma. This is a cohort-based program which allows students to complete their studies on a part-time basis over three years.

The program will have 48 credit hours in-person delivery and 12 credit hours online delivery. Students will also require 3 credit hours (6 weeks, full time) of Field Experience.

Upon successful completion of the program, students are recommended to the Professional Certification Unit of Manitoba Education and Training to teach in public schools in Manitoba.

### **PROGRAM LENGTH**

2-year (60 Credit Hours) completed part-time over 3 years





Application to the School of Music will include an entrance audition and theory assessment test for placement purposes. All students follow a common program for first year.

Upon completion of the first year, students will choose one of the following areas of study:

**General Music Major:** A flexible program, allowing a variety of options. Students may choose between extra emphasis in such areas as arts and science, music theory, music history, or composition.

**Performance Major:** The Performance Major is available in piano, voice, strings, guitar, woodwinds, brass, percussion, percussion/drumset, and jazz. Students in this program

prepare for careers as professional performers or as private teachers. Admission to this Major is available by audition after the completion of the common first year.

Specialist in Music Teaching and Learning Major: A 4-year degree program available to students who achieve high academic standing (3.00 in their first year of study) and wish to pursue certification through a Bachelor of Education (After Degree) after their Bachelor of Music degree. Upon completion of this 6-year program of studies (four plus two years), graduates earn a Manitoba Class 6 Permanent Teacher's Certificate.

### **PROGRAM LENGTH**

Common first year plus three years for a total of four years (124.5 – 141 credit hours)

# Bachelor of Music (BMus)

# (Major in School Music/Bachelor of Education Concurrent)

This program is designed to cultivate student's musical skills while simultaneously developing their understanding of the processes, theories and philosophies of teaching music.

After the common first year in the Bachelor of Music program, students follow one of three streams: elementary, choral, or instrumental. Graduates of this program earn a Manitoba Class 5 Permanent Teacher's Certificate.

# **PROGRAM LENGTH**

3-year Bachelor of Music plus 2-year Bachelor of Education for a total of five years (160.5 to 163.5 Credit Hours)



# **Bachelor of Nursing (BN)**

First year is spent in the Pre-Nursing program completing a series of ten courses before application to year two of the BN program. This is a competitive program as we educate Manitoba's best nurses!

This professional program will prepare graduates to work in a variety of settings with individuals, families, and communities to promote, maintain, and strengthen health. A wide variety of unique and exciting clinical opportunities in acute care settings, long-term care facilities, rural hospitals, mental health, and community placements exist throughout the program.

Professional nurses' associations in Canada are predicting a dramatic increase in the demand for nurses. Graduates of the BN program will be eligible to write the qualifying examinations for licensure as a Registered Nurse (RN) with the College of Registered Nurses of Manitoba (CRNM).

### **PROGRAM LENGTH**

1-year Pre-Nursing (30 Credit Hours) + 3-year Bachelor of Nursing (90 Credit Hours) for a total of four years (120 Credit Hours)




### **CAREER PATHS**

Graduates work as Registered Nurses in areas such as emergency rooms, labour and delivery, public health, medical and surgical units pediatric units, rural and northern hospitals, home care, occupational health and long-term care.



# Indigenous Health Studies Transition Program (IHST)

The IHST is a preparatory program designed to provide the opportunity for Indigenous students to build capacity for academic success, expand their knowledge in math and science, as well as develop writing skills to prepare for a career in the health care field. Upon successful completion of the program, students may pursue multiple career pathways including: Pre-Nursing or Pre-Psychiatric Nursing or other degree programs at BU; Licensed Practical Nursing Diploma or Health Care Aid at Assiniboine College (AC).



First year is spent in the Pre-Psychiatric Nursing program completing a series of ten courses before application to year two of the BN program. This is a competitive program as we educate Manitoba's best psychiatric nurses!

This professional program will prepare graduates to work in a variety of settings with individuals, families, and communities to promote, maintain, and strengthen health. **Two Campuses!** The BScPN program is offered at the Main Campus in Brandon, as well as the Satellite Campus in Winnipeg.

Graduates of the BScPN program will be eligible to write the Registered Psychiatric Nurses or Canada Examination (RPNCE) for licensure as a Registered Psychiatric Nurse (RPN) with the College of Registered Psychiatric Nurses of Manitoba (CRPNM).

### **PROGRAM LENGTH**

1-year Pre-Psychiatric Nursing (30 Credit Hours) + 3-year Bachelor of Science in Pre-Psychiatric Nursing (90 Credit Hours) for a total of four years (120 Credit Hours)

### **CAREER PATHS**

Graduates work independently or as part of a clinical team in roles such as Staff Psychiatric Nurse, Case Manager, Counselor, Clinical Specialist, Care Co-ordinator, or Researcher.



# **Co-op Education Program**

The Co-operative Education Program builds meaningful and relevant work into your degree; you get to learn and earn. With Co-op, you will gain new skills, have career-defining experiences, and develop connections that will last you a lifetime.

Co-op Education can be part of a BA, BFA, BSc, BSES, or BBA degree. There are 26 majors that offer Co-op at Brandon University! Students can choose to apply for the

Co-op program during fall of their second year.

# **Pre-Professional Programs**

Brandon University is often the first choice for students considering further studies. We can prepare you for a variety of programs while you reap the benefits of transitioning to university at a smaller institution closer to home: closer to your support system (family/friends), saving on costs, smaller class size where you get to know your classmates and build relationships with professors (who you may ask to be a reference for further studies), and having access to a full range of Student Services supports (see page 26) to work with you towards your goals.

For admission to many professional programs, you must first complete one or more years of university study. You can take a selection of arts and science courses that qualify you for admission to a professional program or you can complete a full degree before being admitted (some programs require a full degree).

Students considering pre-professional studies should also consult with the institution they plan to attend to confirm admission criteria.

### **GRADUATE PROGRAMS**

BU offers six Graduate Programs that further your opportunities academically and professionally: Master of Education, Master of Science (Environmental and Life Sciences), Master of Music, Master of Psychiatric Nursing, Graduate Diploma in Rural Development, and Master of Arts in Rural Development.



# **Certificate Programs**

Designed to enhance a student's degree program, or to allow local professionals the opportunity to enhance their knowledge and skills. In most cases, all courses completed as part of a certificate program may be applied to a degree program.

# CERTIFICATE IN BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION (30 CH)

The program is designed to provide a strong foundation of business concepts in general management, accounting, finance, marketing, and human resource management. It is aimed at those learners with limited or no prior experience in business administration.



# CERTIFICATES IN FRENCH LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY (CFLP | AND CFLP | II) (30 CH)

These certificates provide students with the necessary practical and theoretical language skills to become efficient speakers and writers of French in their personal or professional lives. The CFLP I is intended for those students who have limited or no previous knowledge of French, while the CFLP II pathway is intended for students who have acquired high school French.

# CERTIFICATE IN PUBLIC HISTORY (CPH) (15 CH)

The Certificate in Public History (CPH) provides students with essential and advanced knowledge of public history, and opens broader employment opportunities locally, nationally, and beyond—where having public history research, writing, and project development/management skills and experiences may be an asset, such as government positions, education, business, and health.

# CERTIFICATE IN JUSTICE STUDIES (JSC) (30 CH)

The JSC is designed to meet the needs of persons who are interested in or currently working within the justice system.

### Career Planning and Placement



# **MÉTIS STUDENT CENTRE**

The Métis Student Centre is a place where Brandon University Métis students can gather to study, tell stories, and make friends in a comfortable environment surrounded by their culture and examples of those who have succeeded before them. # BRANDON UNIVERSITY INDIGENOUS STUDENT COLLECTIVE (BUISC)

The goal of BUISC is to provide services and support to Indigenous and non-Indigenous students on campus. One of the most important things we focus on is being together. # PROGRAMS WITH AN INDIGENOUS FOCUS

### Indigenous Art Major

As part of a Bachelor of Fine Arts, this major combines studies in art history and Indigenous art practice in both historical and contemporary forms. Contemporary Indigenous artists are explored with a focus on critical issues related to art practice, including politics, land, museums, media, and people. Students have the opportunity to engage in drum-making and beadwork as well as cultural teachings related to these forms.

# **Native Languages Minor**

Brandon University is invested in the survival of Indigenous languages in Manitoba. Classes are available in the Cree, Ojibway, and Dakota languages native to Manitoba. These

courses are part of the Languages Department and also part of the Native Studies major in the Bachelor of Arts.

### **PENT Indigenous Teacher Education**

PENT is a community-based teacher education program. Students combine paraprofessional work in their community schools from September to April with courses at Brandon University from April to July. Student teaching is carried out during the school year in conjunction with paraprofessional work.

# **Indigenous Health Studies Transition Program (IHST)**

The IHST is a preparatory program designed to provide the opportunity for Indigenous students to build capacity for academic success, expand their knowledge in math and science, as well as develop writing skills to prepare for a career in the health care field.

"My name is **Kayleigh Tanner** and I'm from Waywayseecappo First Nation Treaty 4. I am studying computer science with a minor in psychology. After I graduate, I think I would either pursue an Education After Degree so that I can teach Indigenous students and give them the opportunities I never had growing up, or a career in Geographic Information Systems.

Last summer I had the opportunity to do a research job with the computer science

department where I visited First Nations communities and gave cybersecurity workshops to students of all ages. At the end of my term, I co-wrote a research paper that was submitted and accepted to the Big Data Conference in Sorrento, Italy! In December I made my way to Italy to present my paper. It was my first time out of the country! I did a lot of exploring, eating, and I even had time to visit the ruins in Pompeii. Doing the presentation was nerve-wracking but I am happy that I did it and got to experience such an awesome opportunity. It felt great to know that the work I did got me all the way to Italy!"

# THE AL AND BEE WAGNER INDIGENOUS TRANSITION PROGRAM

The program focuses on offering transitioning support to Indigenous students starting their education at Brandon University under four pillars: academic, social, personal, and cultural.

Both Flora Cowan Hall and Darrach Hall have toilets that are stall-type, with stall walls and doors, as well as sinks within their respective shared spaces.

#### **TERMS TO KNOW**
