#### GETTING TO KNOW FALLON BROOK

Fallon is currently majoring in philosophy, a discipline that deeply resonates with her interests due to its boundless nature. Within philosophy, there is an emphasis on curiosity and critical thinking.

Such experiences have been instrumental in shaping Fallon's approach to both work and education.

## CURRENT PROJECTS

Fallon is actively involved in the ConnectedMB project - conducted by RDI in collaboration with the Internet Society, Manitoba Chapter. This project focuses on assessing the capacity required for independent community broadband projects and their impact. Her role in the project involves engaging with various communities to better understand how these broadband projects have been conducted in the past. This can include communities that have owned their own fibre networks, as well as those who hired external companies for connectivity. While Fallon has taken on many tasks through project management, she is primarily responsible for community engagement – serving as the main contact for community members. Fallon has been able to work with the diverse project team to learn new skills and adapt to the application of new methods in community engagement as the project evolves.

One of the exciting aspects of the ConnectedMB project is the development of a podcast to document and share research findings. Fallon is enthusiastic about the opportunity to help communities make informed decisions based on their unique capacities, and believes that these understandings can also be useful to build capacity within RDI.

## CONCLUDING REMARKS

Fallon's future is open-ended. She plans to complete her undergraduate degree at Brandon University in 2026, and there is a strong interest in continuing her education through graduate studies. While she is interested in applying the experiences and skills gained from current projects to a community development master's program or engaging in a graduate program that integrates philosophy and community work, she is open to all of the possibilities that lie ahead.
